OBTAINING TEST AUTHORIZATION FAA FORM 8610-2



To receive a FAA Form 8610-2, you must schedule an interview with a Flight Standards District Office (FSDO) Aviation Safety Inspector (ASI or FAA Inspector) to review your experience.

PROCESS

- 1. Verify you have 30 months of experience in an approved military specialty code; find approved codes in FSIMS Figure 5-138 Military Occupational Specialty Codes.
 - *Please note that training for a specialty code does not count toward months of experience.
- 2. Obtain a letter from your exec, maintenance office, or supervisor with A&P certificate, which includes:
 - a. Length of military service,
 - b. Amount of time worked in each military aviation maintenance occupation,
 - c. Make and model of the aircraft and/or engine on which the practical experience was acquired, and
 - d. Where the experience was obtained.
 - *NOTE: If no longer serving, a DD Form 214 may be used.
- 3. Contact the nearest FSDO and set up an appointment. When setting up the appointment, ask for documentation they would like to see in addition to the letter above.

- 4. Fill out and print two copies of the FAA Form 8610-2 to be signed at the conclusion of your appointment. The form can be found at faa.gov/forms/. A sample is available in FSIMS Figure 5-135. Sample FAA Form 8610-2—Application Based on Civil/Military Experience.
